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## Dreams grow from strawberries!

In this issue, Mimitaro talked to the operator of Takano Strawberries (Takano Ichigo-en) in Ryuo, Ms. Era de Oliveira Lilia Kimie.



I came to Japan 20 years ago from Brazil, and have worked at factories for a long time, but I became involved in this line of business after an unexpected turn of events. It all started when I went pear picking in Ryuo with friends

some 13 years ago. We came upon an older woman by the name of Mrs. Takano on the side of the road carrying a bag full of vegetables and we bought some from her. Since then, whenever we buy some of her crops, Mrs. Takano would ask me and my husband to help out in her farm work. We enjoyed farming very much, which is totally different from the work we do in the factory. It also relieved some of our stress. Two or three times a week, we stop by her farm on the way home from our night shift to assist her in harvesting, carrying the soil, among other chores. About ten years passed by in this manner and when Mrs. Takano's health condition deteriorated, she became worried about how she could go on maintaining her crops. She told me then, "I can entrust my strawberries to someone like you", and that's what she did, she handed over the management of her strawberry farm to me. When I began to consider what lies ahead in the future, and the fact that I could not work forever in a factory, and since I had no intention of going back to my home country, I thought of giving agriculture, which could be a lifelong endeavor, a try. Without hesitation, I resigned from my job in the factory and worked with Mrs. Takano for a year, while being properly trained in the cultivation of strawberries. I became independent a couple of years ago. Last year, in addition to 5 strawberry houses, 2 additional new structures made possible from a loan we acquired were built on a land we have bought, and we are now cultivating 10,000 strawberry plants. Since strawberries are delicate crops to grow, it is difficult to determine what may occur, but so far, everything is going well and we barely produce enough strawberries to meet the demands.

Before I started managing the strawberry farm, I underestimated the work involved in it and was confident that I could handle it without much effort since Mrs. Takano at her age, did everything all by herself, but then, I realized that it was a huge mistake. In growing strawberries, one has to visit the greenhouse every day, morning and evening, provide them with water, fertilizer, keep the temperature under control and check the condition of each strawberry. The harvest season is from mid-December until late May, and when that is over, the cultivation of new seedlings will follow, so there really is no time to slack off all throughout the year. Management involves

receiving orders, delivering strawberries to shops and customers' houses and also dealing with customers who come for strawberry-picking. I ask my husband and son to assist me whenever they are available from their individual jobs during harvest time because I cannot manage on my own. There isn't a day when I don't feel nervous because I need to make sure that the strawberries ordered by the customers are fresh and in good condition, furthermore, there should be sufficient supply since we also sell directly. On the contrary, I also worry about leftovers that may rot. When bad weather continues, harvest gets delayed and a snowfall may open holes in the vinyl of the greenhouse if not taken cared of at once. There was an instance when the greenhouse collapsed due to a typhoon, and times like these give me sleepless nights. In the strawberry farm business, the time or day of the week does not matter, such as during preparation for early morning shipment before the break of dawn. In this sense, being an ordinary worker then may have been more comfortable, having fixed working days and days off on weekends. But one remark from the customers, saying "How delicious!" our strawberries are, takes away all the hardships.

My husband and I often talk about the good fortune that came my way, which was having met Mrs. Takano and owning a greenhouse in this locality. The folks around this area are very warm-hearted and are even helpful with the management of my strawberry farm. I am grateful to a lot of people who assisted me in matters I could not possibly have done on my own, like the preparation of documents in the loan application for the construction of the greenhouse. When I deliver strawberries nearby, everyone offers me a drink of tea wherever I go. It is not surprising for foreigners like us living in Japan, especially in old-fashioned areas, to differ in our way of thinking with the local people, depending on their culture and age. As far as I am concerned, the most important thing is to listen well and respect each person I talk to and try my best to satisfy and pay careful attention to each and every customer.

At present, the Takanos are doing well and are still growing vegetables. They visit the greenhouse almost every day and give me advice. Because of this, many people often refer to me as

"Kimie Takano", thinking that I am a relative of the couple. In honor of the Takanos for their kindness, I intend to keep the name, "Takano Strawberries" for good. It is my dream that one day, I could grow a brand of strawberries that Shiga would be proud of.



## Engaging in agriculture

Blessed with water and a fertile land from the lake and mountains, the people of Shiga prefecture have earned their living sustained by their abundant nature. Together with fishery and livestock production, agriculture, such as cultivation of rice, vegetables, fruit trees, flowers, tea, etc., flourished in the old days and "agriculture that cares about the environment" with concern for the water of Lake Biwa is also being implemented. Recently, beginners in agriculture have increased for various reasons like wanting to experience nature or the desire to live a healthy life. The following are information for those who are not satisfied with simple vegetable gardening in verandas and gardening in their yards alone, and would like to make more crops.



- ◆ For those who want to enjoy agriculture: Rent a farm. A rental farm is a small area of land that you can rent at a reasonable price where you can grow your choice of vegetables and flowers. It is your very own small farm. There are rental farms such as allotment gardens managed by the city hall, JA (Japan Agricultural Cooperative), NPO corporations, private farms, etc. Please contact each one respectively as conditions may vary for each.
- ◆ For those who want to work in agriculture: Make the necessary preparations by taking the following steps first!
  - 1. Gather information
    - Consult at the Farming Consultation Desk: 2<sup>nd</sup> flr. Shiga Prefecture Agricultural Education Information Center (syuunou soudan madoguchi) 1-2-20 Matsumoto, Otsu City Tel. 077-523-5505
    - Participate in agricultural events and seminars
  - 2. Experience hands-on farming Participate in agricultural internship (1 to 6 weeks)
  - 3. Acquire skills
    - Study at the Shiga Prefectural Agricultural College (1-year course or 2-year course)
    - · Undergo training from farmers practicing advanced agriculture and from agricultural corporations



**Human Resources Fostering Fund for Next Generation Farmers** (nougyou jisedai ninaite ikusei kikin) A system granting 1.5 million yen annually for a maximum of 2 years to those aiming to become future farmers who will undergo training on advanced farming from agricultural instructors certified by the prefecture, etc., and prefectural agricultural colleges. (Conditions may apply.)

- 4. Make the preparations To engage in agriculture, one method is to be employed in an agricultural corporation or to work for a farmer, while the other is to be on a self-employed basis. There are some who become self-employed farmers after working in agricultural corporations, etc.
  - **Those who will work in agricultural corporations, etc.** Look for job placements at Hello Work, "Shiga Prefecture Agriculture, Forestry and Fishery Owners' Fostering Fund", or search for employers in agricultural corporation websites, etc.
  - **Those who will be self-employed:** In addition to "technical skills", it is also necessary to prepare "funds" and "agricultural land".
    - ▲ Secure the necessary funds To start in agriculture, you need initial investment funds (agricultural land lease fee, machineries, facilities, etc.), working capital (such as fertilizers, pesticides, expenses for lighting and fuel), and you must have a fund for your own living expenses.

**Farming Fund for Youths** (seinentou syuunou shikin) A system that lends funds without interest to those who are accredited as certified new farmers embarking in agriculture. (Conditions may apply.)

- ▲ Secure the agricultural land Buying, selling and leasing of agricultural lands are managed from the perspective of maintaining the rate of self-sufficiency in food throughout the country, etc. and agricultural lands are secured in the following ways:
  - The procedure for acquiring the right to a land takes place after an examination by the agricultural committee of cities and towns.
  - \* There are also measures for taking over an agricultural land with no successor.
  - Notify the intention to buy, sell or lease an agricultural land at the agricultural administrative division of cities and towns, and acquire the right through a public notice by the Agricultural Land Utilization Accumulation Plan.
  - · Apply to borrow a farmland mediated by the Shiga Prefecture Agricultural Land Intermediary Management Organization
