I. The school system in Japan

1. Educational system in Japan

Elementary and junior high school education are compulsory in Japan.


(remark 1) * Part-time courses are often completed in 4 years. Students may graduate in 3 years by taking part-time and correspondence courses simultaneously.

(remark 2) * Courses include fashion, home economics, commerce, industry, medical services, culture, etc.

(remark 3) * Compulsory education is not applicable to children of foreign nationalities.

2. Options after junior high school graduation

The chart below are general options after junior high school graduation.



II. Further studies after junior high school graduation

There are many ways to continue studies after junior high school graduation. You may choose to go on to a senior high school, technical school, specialized training school, or vocational school. For those who wish to continue studies while working, part-time and correspondence courses are also available in high school. Please consult with your teachers.

1. What is the difference between junior high school and senior high school?

In principle, all students are automatically promoted onto the next grade level in junior high school since it is compulsory education. However, in senior high school, students may not be promoted onto the next grade level nor graduate if performance is inadequate or class attendance is low. Regulations differ from school to school.

- 2. Can anyone take the entrance examination for senior high school?
- (1) Individuals aged 15 or above, who graduated from a junior high school in Japan or completed 9 years of education overseas are eligible to take the entrance examination. Students with 8 years of education overseas must:
 - ①Study 1 more year in an educational institution in Japan, or
 - ②Pass the "Junior High School Graduation Certification Examination" held at the end of October every year.

(2) Junior High School Graduation Certification Examination

This examination is conducted by the government of Japan to certify whether or not you have the academic ability equivalent to junior high school graduation. Those who pass this examination have eligibility to take the senior high school entrance examination. Individuals without Japanese nationalities who are aged 15 or above by the end of the school year may also take the examination.

(3) If returning to your home country

Please request all necessary documents to your school in advance (certificate of enrollment, academic transcripts, educational curriculum certificate, and graduation certificate). Official certification by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan is also necessary.

3. Types of schools

Senior high schools in Japan roughly fall into 2 categories, **public senior high schools** and **private senior high schools**. Moreover, they are divided into 3 types according to the time of attendance.

- (1) Senior high schools

<Terminology explanation>

(*1) Personal Evaluation Report (*chousa-sho*)

Achievement (assessment) towards secondary education are evaluated on an absolute 5-point scale for each subject (9 subjects) based on performance during the 3 years of junior high school. Gradings for all subjects in junior high school are written on this document and is submitted to the senior high school for reference during application.

(*2) Exclusive application (sengan) and Multiple applications (heigan)

Exclusive application (*sengan*) for private senior high schools refers to a <u>method of application by pledging to enter if accepted.</u> On the other hand, a **multiple application** (*heigan*) refers to a <u>method of application where, even if accepted into the private high school, the applicant will decline entry if accepted into a public high school after taking the entrance examination that is to be conducted at a later date. If accepted into a private high school by exclusive application (*sengan*), he/she may not take the entrance examination for a public high school that will be held at a later date. There is no distinction between exclusive (*sengan*) and multiple (*heigan*) application for public high schools, as the applicant must enter if accepted.</u>

b) Full-time courses, part-time courses and correspondence courses

Depending on class hours and configuration, senior high schools are divided into the following types. Students attend school during the daytime for full-time courses. Part-time courses are available during the daytime or evening. Students study at home for correspondence courses with the use of teaching materials and television, submit reports, and take guidance classes for interviews on other days such as Sundays. There are part-time and correspondence schools that are under a credit-based system, instead of grade-year system.

② Subjects in senior high schools

There are general subjects, subjects mainly for vocational training (agriculture, industry, commerce, home economics, welfare, etc.) and non-vocational specialized educational subjects (science and mathematics, music, fine arts, physical education, etc.).

A comprehensive subject for specialized studies by category is also available.

(2) Other educational institutions

① "Technical college" (Shiga Prefecture's Technical Schools)

A technical school is a facility for obtaining the knowledge and skills necessary for employment. Maibara Technical College and Kusatsu Technical College exist in Shiga prefecture that provide one-year vocational training for young individuals and those seeking new jobs or looking into changing jobs.

② Specialized training schools and other schools

Other than senior high schools, there are specialized training schools, vocational schools, and other schools where you can receive practical education and specialized training such as Japanese dressmaking, bookkeeping, abacus, car maintenance, cooking and nutrition, hair dressing, beauty care, computer skills, English conversation, and manufacturing.

There are 2 specialized training schools in the prefecture with upper secondary courses that accept junior high school graduates, shown in the table below.


(3) Jobs and qualifications

Certain jobs require for you to take and pass a national examination. When taking such examinations, it is necessary to keep in mind that there may be certain prerequisites depending on the occupation. Some examinations may require an educational background, while others may not. Some examinations may not have educational background restrictions, however, may require knowledge equivalent to senior high school graduation or university graduation.

Some examples of qualifications and their corresponding occupations are explained below:

- ① Examples of occupations/qualifications that may be taken by junior high school graduates licensed cook, hair-stylist, barber, etc.
- ② Examples of occupations/qualifications that require knowledge and skills of university graduation or equivalent-doctor, dentist, veterinarian, pharmacist, teacher, judge, lawyer, certified accountant, counselor for better quality of life, social education officer, child welfare commissioner, etc.
- ③ Examples of occupations/qualifications that are advantageous for graduates of senior high school in regular courses nurse, childcare worker, civil servant, librarian, health nurse, midwife, etc.
- ④ Examples of occupations/qualifications that are advantageous for graduates of senior high school in technical courses gas welder, boiler operator, electrical engineer (type 1, 2, 3), qualified architect (level 1, 2), car mechanic (level 2, 3), etc.
- (5) Examples of occupations/qualifications that are advantageous for graduates of senior high school in vocational course tax accountant, administrative scrivener, licensed social insurance consultant, information technology engineer, certified welfare worker, etc.

The Nationality Clause:

"According to the clause, Japanese nationality is a prerequisite for taking the recruitment examination of general civil servants engaged in public authority or constitution of the national will." (Source: Wikipedia).

Recently, movement for elimination of the Nationality Clause at the local public authority level is spreading, and restrictions in the field of education and medicine are also easing at the national level. Please verify the conditions for recruitment examinations in advance as the prerequisite for the Nationality Clause differ among occupations and regions.

4. School fees

After graduating junior high school, tuition is required in order to study in senior high school. First of all, an "examination fee" is required to take the entrance examination, and "admission fee" is required for admission after passing the exam. Moreover, a fixed amount of "tuition fee" is required every year.

Private senior high schools require fees such as "facility fee" (for replenishment of buildings and equipment) and vocational schools require fees such as "laboratory and practical training fee". These fees, called "gakkou noufukin" must be paid to the school. Prefectural high schools require expenses for textbooks and other fees for leaning.

There is a substantial difference in education fees depending on the type, field of study, and administrative organization of the school. Please look into the fees required at the school you wish to go to in advance.

- O Textbooks and teaching material fees, Parent-Teacher Association fees and savings for the school trip (shuugaku ryokou) are determined by each school.
- Commuter pass may be purchased at a student discount for those who use JR, private railways and buses.
- O Tuition support programs (After admission in April)
 - The High School Tuition Support Fund (koutougakkoutou shuugaku shienkin) provides assistance for households with students in national, public or private high schools and other designated educational institutions. Households with guardians whose annual income is less than approx. 9.1 million yen* are eligible for assistance, while additional support is supplemented to households whose annual income is less than approx. 5.9 million yen * for private high school students. There is no need to repay the Tuition Support Fund.
- O Support programs for expenses other than tuition (about July every year after the enrollment)

 Supplemental Scholarship Fund (shuugaku no tameno kyuufukin) is available for expenses other than tuition for those students who entered senior high school etc., (those applicable for the Tuition Support Fund, excluding those in the special needs senior high school course) after April, 2014 with guardians of low-income households (tax-exempt with annual income of less than approx. 2.7 million yen*) living in Shiga prefecture.

- * Based on the total of guardian's taxable income (standard taxable value). It is made on an assumption of a family of four with one guardian working, one senior high school student (aged 16 or over) and one junior high school student, with an annual income of approximately 9.1 million yen, 5.9 million yen and 2.7 million yen.

5. Scholarship (Loan Fund) system

A financial assistance system is available for students who have difficulties in paying their school fees. There are restrictions on the applicant's financial situation. Please consult your school for details.

6. Student selection process in senior high school

(1) Types of student selection

There are 3 types of student selection: "General selection", "Referral selection", "Special selection" and "Referral selection in sports, culture and arts".

"General selection"...Based on scores of academic performance tests and personal evaluation report (kojin chousa houkukokusho). There are also interviews and practical examinations.

"Referral selection"...Based on 1 or 2 of the following criteria: interview, essay, practical examination

"Special selection"...Based on at least 2 of the following criteria: general questions, short essay, oral examination, practical examination

"Referral selection in sports, culture and arts"...Based on at least 1 of the following criteria: practical examination, interview, essay or short essay. Schools carrying out "Special selection" may include general questions for "Special selection".

(2) Special consideration for entrance examinations of prefectural senior high schools

When students need special consideration during the entrance examination, the "Application for Special Arrangements for foreign and returnee students" (*Kaigai Kikoku Seitotou Toriatsukai Sochinegai*) is submitted to the school you wish to enter. Please consult the senior high school through your junior high school regarding details for consideration.

Eligibility for "Application for Special Arrangements for foreign and returnee students" (Kaigai Kikoku Seitotou Toriatsukai Sochinegai)

Returnees and foreign students who meet all of the following requirements:

- ① Period of stay in Japan: The period from the day of returning or arrival in Japan until February 1, 2023 is within 6 years.
- 2 Period of living abroad: The period of continuously living abroad before returning or arrival in Japan is more than 1 year.

Consideration: For entrance examination questions, Kanji characters may be accompanied with Japanese hiragana, examination time may be increased and dictionaries may be used for the purpose of translating foreign words to Japanese and vice-versa. (Up to 2 dictionaries are allowed, however, dictionaries in English are prohibited.)

[Entrance examination terminology]

- "Heigan" (Multiple applications): Students could apply not only to their first choice of school, but other schools as well.
 - ① Application to more than one public/prefectural senior high school is prohibited, even if the school is located in another prefecture.
 - ② Excluding candidates with referral for private senior high schools (*sengan*), multiple applications (*heigan*) for a prefectural senior high school and private senior high school or between different private high schools may be possible if entrance examination dates differ.

[&]quot;Gansho": application form to apply for an entrance examination.

[&]quot;Shiboukou": the school which one would like to apply to.

[&]quot;Shutsugan": the act of submitting a gansho to the school of interest.

[&]quot;Chousa-sho": a personal evaluation report with a record of academic performance, attendance and school activities (ex. committee membership or any awards, etc.) in junior high school.

[&]quot;Sengan" (Exclusive application): To apply to only one school of interest. If the candidate who applied by this method for a private senior high school passes the entrance examination, he/she will have to go to the school. The chance of passing is higher compared to that of "multiple application".

[&]quot;Koukou taiken nyuugaku": While in junior high school, students are able to experience senior high school life in their desired school. This "trial day" is carried out during summer holidays in August, or weekends in the second semester in most schools.

[Sansha-mendan] (Student-guardian-teacher meeting) Discussion between the student, guardian, and teacher regarding the student's future academic/career path. Many schools have this discussion in July and December. The aim of this discussion is to have an idea for the student's future, to clarify current goals, and for the three parties involved to have a common understanding in regards to the details being discussed.

This discussion may also be arranged at any time upon request. Please consult with your teacher as soon as possible for any concerns.

8. School life in senior high school

The school year starts in April and ends in March. Various events are held throughout the year, where guardians may be asked to visit the school for a meeting among other guardians in some cases, and others that require a sum of money such as for the school trip (shuugaku ryokou). Details will be provided by the school.

[Example of main school events throughout the year]

- Semester 1: Starting ceremony, entrance ceremony, medical check-up, physical measurements, field trips, student-guardian-teacher meeting, regular tests, closing ceremony, summer vacation
- Semester 2: Starting ceremony, Sports Day, School festival/ Study presentation, student-guardian-teacher meeting, regular tests, closing ceremony, winter vacation
- Semester 3: Starting ceremony, school trip, student-guardian-teacher meeting, regular test, graduation ceremony, closing ceremony, spring vacation
 - * Some schools have a 2-semester system instead of a 3-semester system.
 - Students may not be promoted from 1st year to 2nd year, or 2nd year to 3rd year for inadequate achievements or poor class attendance. "Ryuunen" refers to a student repeating the same grade.

~A standard day in a senior high school ~ (Example for a full-time school)

The school starts at 8:30 am. There are 4 lessons in the morning (50 minutes / lesson) and 2 more after lunch. There are 6 lessons in one day. Each subject is taught by a different teacher. There are afterschool clubs in sports or culture, where the student decides whether or not to join. Lunch is not provided, so students must bring their own lunches or eat in the cafeteria for schools with such a facility. Most schools require students to wear uniforms.

9. Others

Employment: The following are ways to find jobs.

Look for a job at "Hello Work *" (public job placement center) through the school

*"Hello Work" is a place where people can find jobs. Consultations regarding employment are also available. (Some "Hello Work" centers provide consultations in Portuguese and Spanish)

I am not sure which path to take after graduation from junior high school.

After graduating from junior high school, there are various institutions to continue your study: senior high schools, technical schools (senmon gakko), technical schools (senshu gakko), other schools (kakushu gakko), vocational schools (shokugyo gakko), part-time high schools (teiji-sei) and correspondence schools (tsushin-sei). Actively attend orientations, school tours and entry trials to collect information regarding the school. Think about what you want to do, what you are good at, and the skills you have, and consult with your teachers and family to make a decision. You may use the reference materials below:

I would like to become a nurse. What should I do?

After junior high school graduation, there are various paths you may choose from, such as going to a technical school or specialized school, going to a practical nursing school or university with a nursing course after senior high school graduation, or going to a nursing college. Either way, you must pass the National Certification Examination for Nursing. There are schools for nursing in Shiga. Please consult with your teachers.

I did not graduate junior high school, but would like to go to senior high school.

The government of Japan offers a certification exam once a year to determine if your academic skills are equivalent to the level of junior high school graduates. If you pass this exam, you will have the qualification to enter senior high school. Even if you don't have Japanese nationality, you may take this exam as long as you are 15 years or older by the end of the fiscal year.

I would like to quickly obtain a skill such as manufacturing and start working.

Technical College in Shiga prefecture, a school for skill development assuming employment after completion of the class, offers one-year courses. Courses offered include: clothing design, wooden building architecture and metal manufacturing. Please consult with your teachers.

I would like to study while working at the same time.

Part-time high school or correspondence courses are available. Daytime or evening classes are available for part-time schools. Correspondence classes require for you to study at home and submit reports during the week, and attend classes on weekends. This type of school is a credit-based system, rather than a grade-system. Please consult with your teachers.

Please make use of various financial aid programs to support paying your tuition. Shiga educational fund (Shiga-ken Shogaku Shikin), Mary St. Joseph financial aid, and other organization and local government-supported programs are available.

1. Regular courses



4 Part-time · Correspondence Education



Part-time schools: Schools for individuals who want to study while working and advance to new goals, where daytime and evening classes are available. Students may acquire a senior high school graduation certificate in 3 years by completing necessary credits.

Correspondence courses: There are no screening tests for admission. The courses are established to provide a high school education opportunity to those who cannot attend school every day due to family, work or personal reasons. One may acquire a high school graduate certificate by attending school for more than 3 years and obtaining the number of credits required. Learning is carried out in 3 ways; through reports (submitting assignments), screening (interview lessons), and tests.


